



Submissions may be edited, delayed, or declined by the Chronicler.



The season of giving is upon us, and even amid the holiday gifts, now is a good time to start thinking ahead to another traditional giving occasion for our Shire: our presentation of a tithe and largesse to the Kingdom. Chieftains at the Barony of Three Rivers in February marks the anniversary of our Shire's founding, and we honor the occasion with these contributions each year.

The tithe is a monetary donation from the Shire to the Kingdom, drawn from the proceeds of our Autumn Arrows event (which did quite well this year).

Largesse, on the other hand, invites more of a personal touch from each of our members. Their Royal Majesties' household maintains a cache of gifts which the Crown can give to their loyal subjects. Indeed, conspicuous generosity was part of the image of a good sovereign in period! Our own Shire recently received such gifts as thanks for hosting Autumn Arrows (see image on page 4, lower right). These gifts in turn are contributed by loyal subjects throughout the Kingdom, including our Shire.

What might you give toward Their Majesties' largesse? The possibilities are endless! Ask yourself: what talents can you offer? What would you enjoy giving? What would you be happy to receive? What would be useful to a range of SCA folk with a variety of personae, interests, genders, etc.?

Some ideas:

- Garb, accessories, trims
- Scroll covers (these are stiff, fabriccovered folders to help honorees get their award scrolls home safely)
- > Medallions for Orders of Honor (e.g. Torse, Fyrd, Silver Hammer, etc.)
- Cords and chains for said medallions
- > Project kits, tools, and supplies (e.g. fabric, yarn, needles, knives, quills, etc.; this editor was grateful to receive a scribal kit with paints and brushes)
- > Drinking vessels and other feast gear

- > Non-perishable treats, period spices, etc. (make certain all food or fragrance items include a complete ingredients list!)
- Beeswax; we can all use beeswax
- > Cold-weather gear: blankets, hats, gloves, etc. (I've heard stories of Their Majesties handing these out to grateful fighters at cold-weather wars)
- > Hot-weather gear: fans, neck coolers, water bottle covers, etc.
- > Martial items like archery gloves and arm guards, throwing knives, rattan, etc.
- > Toys, period games with instructions
- Notebooks, thank-you cards, parchment or parchment-like paper, etc.
- > Bags, boxes, and pouches
- > Towels and handkerchiefs
- > First-Aid kits and other emergency-ready items

And this is only a sample!

recipe of the month: an english sweet pubbing

From a 15th-century manuscript of "Ancient Cookery"

For those of us raised on the Englishlanguage literature of the Christmas season, English Christmas Puddings are famous. The traditional bond between the holiday and the dish is more recent than one might think, but English sweet puddings themselves have deep roots. This one still seems pretty readable:

A Flaune of Almayne.

First take raysins of Coraunce, or elles other fressh reysins, and gode ripe peres, or elles gode appuls, and pyke oute the cokes of hom, and pare hom, and grinde hom, and the reysins in a clene morter, and do then to hom a lytel swete creme of mylk, and streyne hom

thurgh a clene streynour, and take x [10] egges, or as many mo as wol suffice, and bete hom wel togedur, bothe the gwyte and the yolke, and draw hit thurgh a streynour, and grate faire gwyte bred, and do therto a gode quantitie, and more swete crem, and do therto, and do al this togedur; and take saffron, and pouder of ginger, and canel [cinnamon], and do therto, and a lytel salt, and a quantitie of faire swete buttur, and make a faire coffyn [pastry crust, esp. one not meant to be eaten], or two, or as many as needes, and bake hom a lytel in an oven, and do this bature in hom, and let bake hom as thow woldes bake flaunes, or crustades, and when thay byn baken ynogh, strawe upon hom pouder of canel, and of qwyte sugur. And this is a gode maner of Crustade.

Found via Cariadoc's Miscellany, which has <u>a</u> modern redaction and rates the recipe as "good."



Here's a two-for-one gift for the Christmas season: the lavishly decorated full-page Chi-Rho monogram from the Book of Kells.

The monogram combines the Greek letters chi (χ) and rho (ρ) as an abbreviation for "Christ," forming a Christian symbol that dates back to the Roman emperor Constantine in the 300s ce.

The Book of Kells, created in Ireland or Scotland c. 800 ce, is probably the most famous illuminated manuscript in the world, a masterwork of Insular (i.e. British Isles) illumination and calligraphy. The graceful geometry and intricate interlaces of pages like this inspire "Celtic" aesthetics to this day.
